Why are we interested in Urban Exploration?

- Between May 2017 May 2018 CityCo experienced a 200% increase in calls for support from its members about the issue
- Variation in advice from the public sector during and after an incident
- Court action underway opportunity input from other members
- Unclear legal position advice from CityCo is understand the difference between civil trespass (being there) aggravated (preventing lawful business)




Recap On Issue

Urban Explorers "Rooftoppers" causing alarm in the city and across the country, gaining access to restricted areas and putting themselves and others at risk of serious injury/death.

- Suicidal or just thrill-seeking?
- Need developed for partnership approach
- Concern for safety of young people, staff and bystanders





Since We Met In July

Some emerging evidence that Urban Exploration websites are being used as research tools for more nefarious activities.

- Theft of materials from construction sites (roofing and metal)
- Squatting and activism
- Hostile reconnaissance
- Arson



Active Individuals & Groups In Manchester & Salford

CityCo maintains a register of social media sites we monitor on behalf of our members. AV on request (updated daily but needs business input to be effective). Small business community won't drive much income but worth monitoring:

- E.g 1.5 million views = £4K income on YouTube
- Attractive as sponsorship partners
- TWINZZ, North Face, Converse, Nikon

Drone Update

- The regulations have been tightened up
- Drones need an operator look for them
- Over 250gs (9oz in old money) must be regulated



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Partnership Agreement

Partnership agreed between Greater Manchester Police, Manchester City Council, CityCo & Business Crime Reduction Partnership (BCRP). The BCRP has signed off on a defined exclusion criteria to act as a deterrent to individuals found on rooftops.

- The exclusion definition is under Reduction of Risk/Harm to self or others
- The exclusion is for ADULTS (18 and over) and is for 2 years

Partnership Agreement

Juveniles will be managed through a joint partnership letter issued by MCC/GMP to parents requesting support to reduce the risk of repeat incidents.

Juveniles will be required to commit to an ABC (Acceptable Behaviour Contract). Failure to may result in further sanctions being sought.

- ✓ ABC Letters have been issued since July
- √ 1 x Adult exclusion issued since July

Acceptable Behaviour Agreement

This agreement is made on XXX following XXXX gaining unauthorised access to XXXX. The Council and Greater Manchester Police work in partnership to keep children and young people in the city safe.

This Agreement is between:

- I, XXXXXX agree the following in respect of my future conduct. I will not:
 - Gain outside roof access to any building in Manchester without written permission, which can be produced immediately to any police officer, security officer or any person employed at the building.
 - Access any part of any building in Manchester to which the public would not normally be allowed, and not for a legitimate pre-arranged appointment or authorised purpose.
 - Gain access to constructions within building site premises (including but not limited to scaffolding and cranes) in Manchester which are prohibited to members of the public.
 - Use social media to publicise the above acts.

Dear parents / guardians,

Re: Concerns about the safety of your son xxx

I am the manager of the Council's community safety and anti social behaviour team covering Manchester city centre. My team works in partnership with Greater Manchester Police and one of our shared community safety priorities is to keep children and young people safe.

The Council and Greater Manchester Police are aware of a current issue in the city centre whereby children and adults are gaining unauthorised access to buildings of height, scaffolding and chanes and regularly posting videos and images on social media.

We are concerned that your son has been identified as gaining unauthorised access to the roof area of Manchester Arndale on 21 June 2018 in the company of another young person.

The first and foremost reason for writing to you is to share our concerns to prevent your son from being involved in a tragic accident. The risks involved in the activity that your son has been involved in are apparent from the numbers of deaths in the UK and around the world.

We also want to prevent your son from being prosecuted for any criminal offences such as public nuisance or criminal damage for example.

I would be grateful if you could contact me on receipt of this letter to discuss our concerns and arrange a time for PC Walker and I to meet with you and your son.

We are seeking reassurance from you and XXX that XXXX will not gain unauthorised access to buildings nor climb cranes, scaffolding or buildings in Manchester.

We look forward to hearing from you.



Mitigation

Raise Awareness

Brief teams on signs and patterns:

- Propped doors
- Failed attempts to access
- Clothing business suits, high vis, dressed as delivery drivers, emergency services, hard hats
- Odd phone enquires, asking for suite addresses, flat numbers
- Surveillance appropriate to use the hostile mitigation principles
- Unusual behaviours "sodding about"


CRANES!

- Have you left the keys in it?
- Was it secured as you left?
- ✓ Site uniform controlled?
- ✓ Foreman's site briefings report activity
- ✓ Out of hours checks a few attempts (Mon Fri, 9-5)

Warning signs in seemingly inaccessible areas:

- Internal action you will take
- Exclusion orders in operation
- Going underground new trend for hacking sewers and plant rooms







Mitigation

Weak Spots in Day-to-Day Management

Review your parcel delivery procedures (access gained posing as DHL/Amazon etc.):

- ✓ In multi occupancy buildings what's your policy?
- ✓ On construction sites who controls drivers?
- ✓ Can you accompany visitors?
- ✓ Do you investigate breaches?
- ✓ Do you test your perimeter?
- ✓ Do you vary your routine?
